A woman with mental illness was just killed last week by a police officer in my neighborhood in Miami Shores. She had apparently called 911 for help and was shot multiple times in her own yard.

00:27:14 Diane Reynolds Provoking Hope: This is the story of Provoking Hope Recovery Support. We have 30+ staff, all of which are recovering folks. Meeting folks right where they are. The window is open a bit at the Crisis time, although it may be a week or so later. We call it "top of the mind consciousness" of the idea of changing our pathways.
