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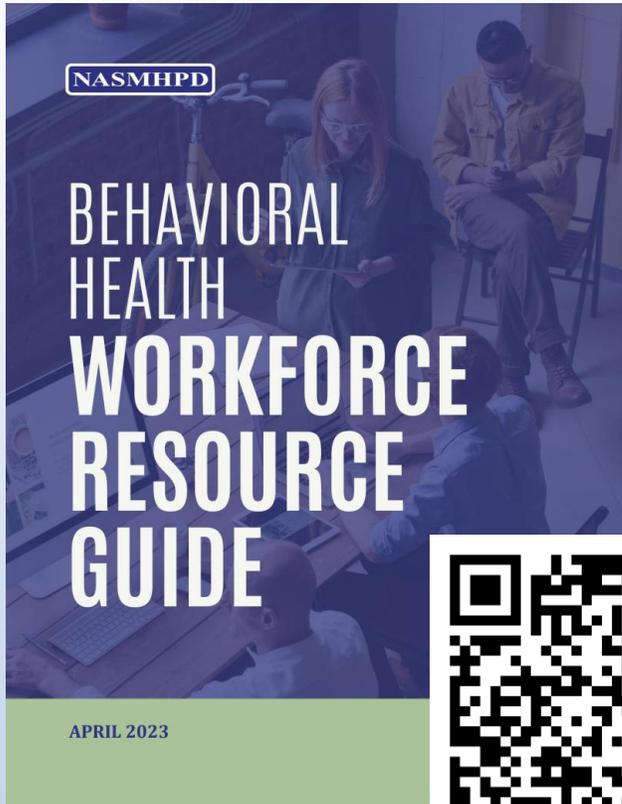
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State Mental Health Authority as the Setting

 - Available funding for services and innovation

- Decrease demand for acute services
- Assure adequate reimbursement
- Update statutes/regulations/policies

Trends in State Level Strategies

- Developing new entry programs and incentives
- Eliminating barriers to entering the field
- Expanding peer support and adjunct roles
- Increasing the use of technology
- Improving wages and benefits
- Creating supportive work environments
- Focusing on equity and diversity

Reimagine the Treatment Team

- Expand pool of potential candidates by updating HR policies
- Create new roles
 - Peer support, navigators, liaisons
 - Interns, apprentices, mentors
 - Administrative assistants
- Revise current job descriptions
 - Background checks
 - Educational requirements
 - Supported employment opportunities (MH, SUD, I/DD, BI)
- Assure accommodations for disabilities
 - Environment of care
 - Workflow
 - Communication

Technology First

- Explore technological options before adding duties to staff
- Telehealth, remote work/hybrid, flexible hours
- Multiple uses of I-Pad for mobile crisis & crisis stabilization:
 - Contact with family/support
 - Individualized learning
 - Adaptive communication (plain language, videos, spoken word, interactive)
 - Relaxation techniques, journaling
- Interpreter services and communication devices
- Decrease administrative burden
 - Record review and trend analysis
- Enhance onboarding, staff training, and ongoing education
 - Using AI as a training tool

Creating Supportive Work Environments

- Is your work culture trauma-informed for staff?
 - Do they have a voice and choice?
 - Do they feel empowered, respected, supported, and appreciated?
 - How do you know?
- Are your staff skilled at conflict resolution?
- Embrace a New Perspective
 - Attract vs. Recruit
 - Engage vs. Retain

Cross-sector Partnerships for Collective Impact

- Who are your traditional partners and who else needs to be at the table?
 - Create synergy
 - Decrease duplicative effort
- Workforce development experts
 - Different skill set than human resources
 - Develop a strategic plan with short- and long-term goals
 - Create a trauma-informed workplace culture
- Higher education
 - Career paths using stacked credentials and college credit
 - Program evaluation and satisfaction surveys

Top 10 Tips for BUILDING YOUR WORKFORCE INNOVATION INFRASTRUCTURE

- 1** Communicate the changing narrative around helping professions and the central importance of workforce to the future of behavioral health. 
- 2** Consult with workforce experts and organizations to build shared expertise critical to successful workforce innovation and development. 
- 3** Create a governance/advisory group or groups that offer access to ideas, expertise, and collaboration needed to scale innovations. 
- 4** Secure financial support to enable and sustain workforce expansion and innovation. 
- 5** Embed technology advances and solutions to "future-proof" your strategies. 
- 6** Use data partnerships and resources to inform and evaluate workforce efforts. 
- 7** Identify management structures and staff support to build internal capacity to support implementation of workforce initiatives. 
- 8** Prioritize cross-sector collaboration to maximize impact within the larger behavioral health and developmental and intellectual disabilities workforce ecosystem. 
- 9** Establish metrics and evaluation processes required to prove that new approaches are making a difference - and to inform adjustments when they aren't. 
- 10** Combine quick wins with long-term approaches. Systems' change takes time - and executing small innovation projects right away builds trust and fuels next steps.

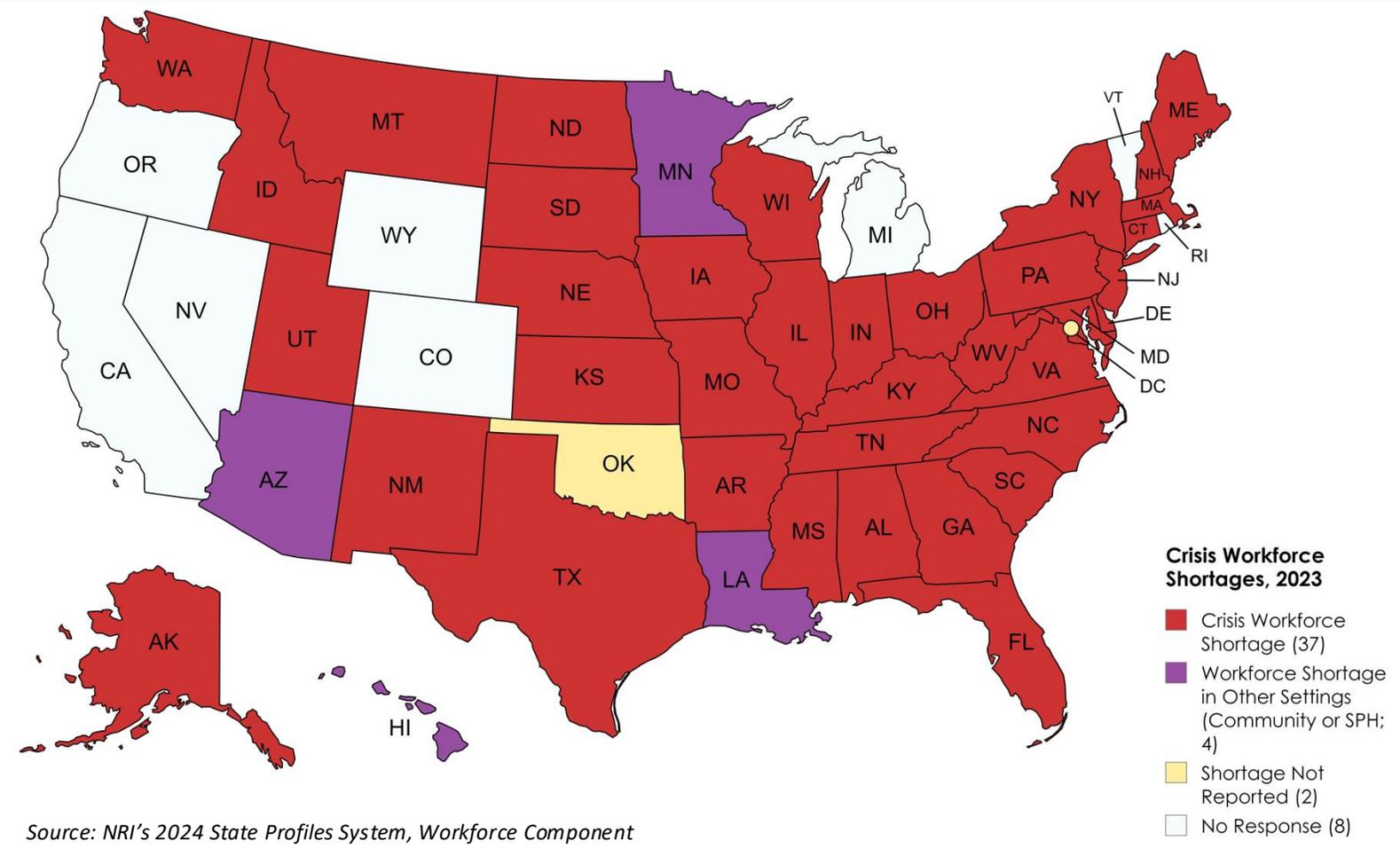

Workforce Shortage Across the Crisis Continuum

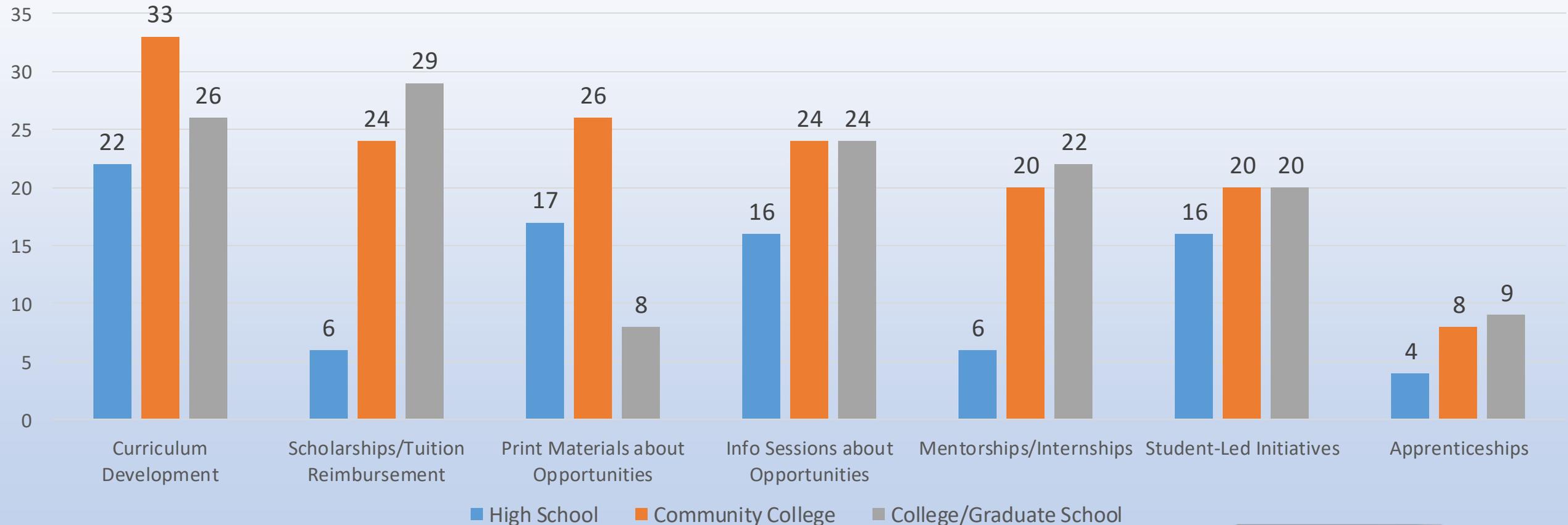


State Behavioral Health Workforce Shortages and Initiatives, 2023

- States with a crisis workforce shortage on the map may also be experiencing workforce shortages in other community settings and state hospitals
- Overall, of **43 responding states**, workforce shortages exist in:
 - 35 - state hospitals
 - 37 - community settings
- 41 states have workforce shortages in state hospitals, crisis settings, and other community settings

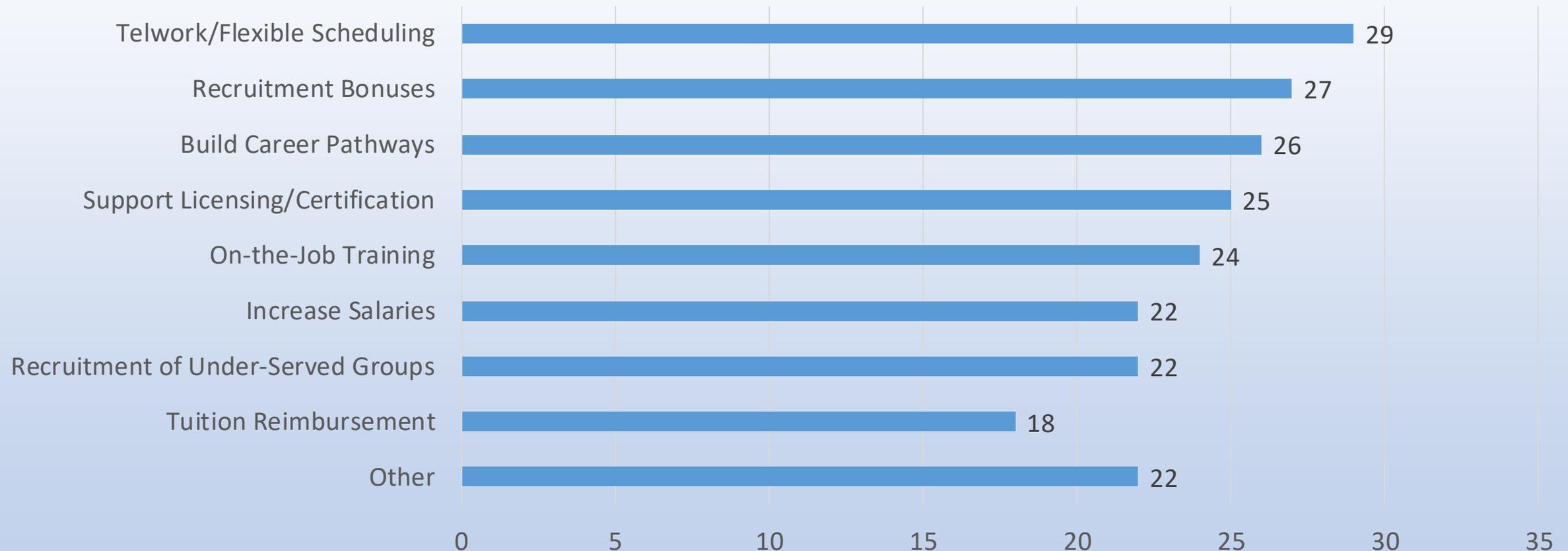
NRI Data on Workforce Challenges: Growing the Behavioral Health Workforce

NRI Data on Workforce Challenges: Recruiting the Behavioral Health Workforce

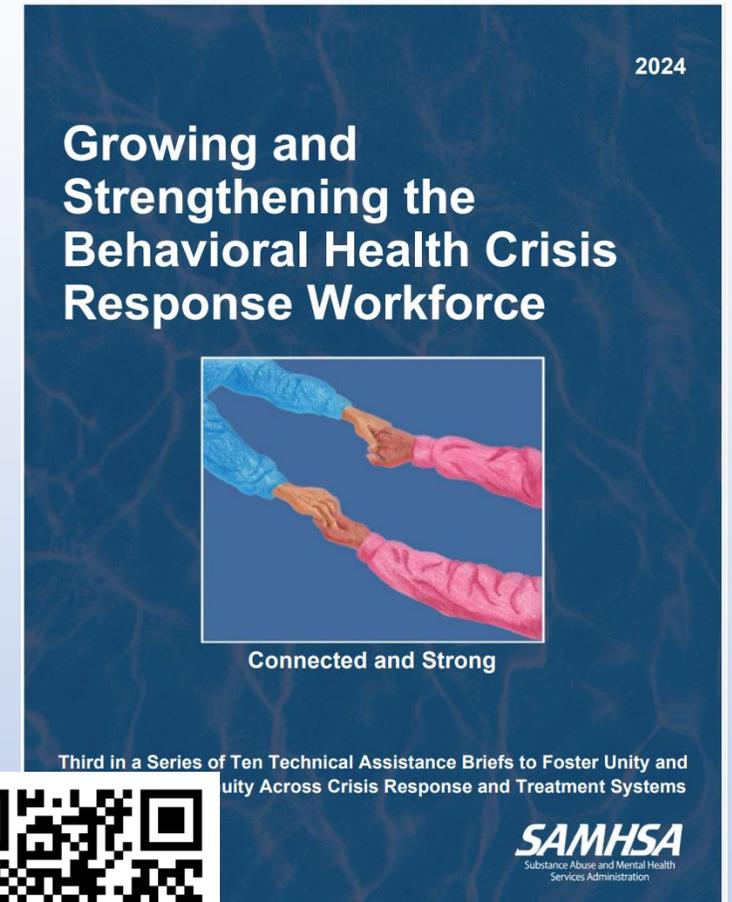
State Behavioral Health Workforce Recruitment Initiatives, 2024 (n=43)

 - Employee and organizational-level insights on barriers to recruitment, retention, and wellness among crisis response and behavioral health workforce.
 - Low pay and funding barriers are the biggest challenge to recruitment and retention.
 - Bureaucratic requirements at the state level for job posting and approval processes hinder the hiring process.
 - Highlights initiatives to grow and strengthen the workforce.
 - Utilizing peer support professionals and bachelor's-level staff with appropriate supervision, can increase the workforce.
 - Championing employee wellness is critical to retaining a qualified workforce.
